hanks to our donors, the EFC is uniting Evangelicals to bless Canada in the name of Jesus. In fact, that's our new mission statement. We spoke with EFC President Bruce J. Clemenger to understand more.

The EFC recently changed its mission statement, that important direction-setting phrase that tries to capture the heart of what the EFC does. Can you explain why you felt the change was necessary?

We wanted a compelling and focused statement that communicates the mission of the EFC. We wanted to bring more precision to our old statement of "Together for influence, impact and identity." Having influence and impact are still priorities for the EFC. Fostering an engaging and compelling evangelical identity is what we are about. The new statement sharpens our purpose and focuses our energy on bringing Evangelicals together to positively impact Canada as disciples of Jesus, whether in mobilizing for service to others or in bringing the wisdom of Scripture to debates on law and public policy.

The mission statement is: "Uniting Evangelicals to bless Canada in the name of Jesus." What is at its heart?

We are to love God and our neighbour as ourselves, and to make disciples of all nations – the Great Commandment and the Great Commission. Our statement gives expression to how The Evangelical Fellowship of Canada, an association of Evangelicals, can respond to these two biblical mandates.

Why was it so important to say "in the name of Jesus" at the end of it?

As followers of Jesus, we are under His Lordship. All that we do, we do in service to Him, empowered by the Holy Spirit and as an expression of our love for God. You could make the comparison in politics to ambassadors. They act and speak in the name of their government, just as we speak and act in the name of our Lord. We bless others. We speak the truth in love. When we bless others, it is not when we feel like being nice, but is for us a life of service to others. "In the name of Jesus" reminds us of that, and is a testimony to others.

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What is the most important thing you want supporters and partners to the EFC to know about this new mission statement?

We bless others individually, but we can also do it collectively both in word and deed: as small groups; as congregations; as groups of churches and as ministries. The EFC wants to highlight the collective dimension of blessing others, of expressing God's love. We want to explore ways in which together we can make a difference in the lives of our neighbours and in Canada.

What action role do you want Canadian Evangelicals to step into in the country and in their communities?

We want to foster a culture among Evangelicals that actively looks to see what the needs are in our communities, in our provinces and in our country and explore what we might do to respond with compassion and love as we bring the truths of Scripture and live out God's call to love and justice in our service to all — this is our witness.

What lies ahead in the remaining months in 2015 for the EFC?

We are working on collaborative initiatives to mobilize Evangelicals to get involved strategically to address some critical issues facing our country: issues like palliative care, refugee settlement, and caring for children and youth. These are issues that require engagement in law and public policy and also the participation of local congregations in caring for our neighbours in the name of Jesus. We will continue to be strong advocates for religious freedom, the sanctity of life, and justice and compassion in the courts as on Parliament Hill.



Canadian voters have been downloading the EFC Federal Election Kit at www.theEFC.ca/election, created to equip voters to ask the right questions of the right people.


Available in both official languages, the kit calls Canadians to prayer and offers important guidelines for churches about the activities they can engage in during an election

that do not contravene the restrictions put upon them as charities.

Clear lists of "what you can do" and "what you cannot do" have helped Canadian congregations navigate this campaign within safe parameters. Brief overviews of issues of concern for compassionate Canadians concerned about biblical principles of mercy, compassion and sanctity of life are a popular element in the kit. These overviews also offer direct, pointed guestions that voters can ask their candidates.

The topics included in the kit are: children and youth in government care; the environment; family integrity; Indigenous Peoples; palliative care, poverty and homelessness; prostitution; religious freedom in Canada; reproductive and genetic technologies; global poverty reduction; religious freedom internationally; abortion; euthanasia and assisted suicide, and of course, refugees.

Updating you on Canada's most immediate issues

◆ The EFC's Election Kit attracted a lot of attention and was used by Evangelicals to ask questions on key issues of candidates looking for their vote. After the election, consider writing your Member of Parliament,

whether they were newly elected or re-elected, and congratulate them. Whether you voted for them or not, they are your elected representative and have an important task, one that is challenging and complex. The Apostle Peter encourages us to show proper respect to those who are in authority. Tell them you will be praying for them and commit to do so on a regular basis. Consider writing to the candidates who lost in your riding, thanking them for their willingness to run for office and contribute to the democratic process.

◆ Assisted Suicide and Euthanasia: The EFC made a submission to the Canadian Provincial/Territorial Expert Advisory Group on Physician-Assisted Dying in September and is working collaboratively with evangelical leaders and leaders of other faith groups leaders to express our deep

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concern over the movement towards assisted suicide and promote good quality palliative care. We believe the proper response is that of compassion and care for those who are dying and their families.

Immediately after the election, the Federal Government's External Panel on Options for a Legislative Response to *Carter v. Canada* will begin to hold consultations exploring the ways in which the Federal Government can respond to the Supreme Court's decision allowing assisted suicide in certain circumstances. The Panel is to report back to the government later this year. As one of the interveners in the case, the EFC is one of the stakeholder groups that will be consulted. We have begun preparing our submission.

◆ Trinity Western University's legal challenge of the BC Law Society's decision not to accredit TWU's proposed law was heard late in August. The EFC intervened and at the time of writing this, a decision has not been handed down. Trinity Western lost a similar case in Ontario and the Ontario Court of Appeal has agreed to hear TWU's appeal. The EFC is seeking intervener status in this case along with Christian Higher Education Canada. The EFC has been granted intervener status in the appeal in Nova Scotia. In that province the court sided with TWU but that decision was appealed and we are preparing our intervention.
